Agenda/Notes:

1. Follow up from EFI Conference
 - a. Notes from the Building Inclusive Forecasts Workshop
 - b. McLachlan Lab Text on Barriers to Inclusion in Forecasting that can be revised for a Blog Post
 - c. For this workshop - make summary of workshops and key take homes that can be a blog post or tweeted - get the message across. Don't make the recording public. But do make the recordings public for some of the other workshops (Standard/Cloud Computing, Coral Disease Forecasting, Macrosystems EDDIE)
 - d. Synthesize this workshop and take homes as a blog post. Jason doesn't have time for writing a paper, but do want to get this out and a blog post could be a good way to do this and can be a good connection to the ethics project from the Education
 - e. Do we want to work on this or the guidelines or both at the same time?
 - i. Pick each of the sections and each person and others in EFI to write something short about it.
 - ii. Can use the McLachlan lab document - edit it and turning it into sentences and invite others to contribute
 - iii. Worried about sending it to everyone who attended the workshop and getting feedback
 - f. Use the draft from the McLachlan lab and the feedback from the Conference workshop to create a blog post.
 - g. Since the first EFI meeting in DC - we have made a lot of progress in terms of being aware of diversity and making it more central to the project, but we aren't that much more diverse of a group. We are working on it, it is a slow process, but is worth keeping in mind and continuing to work on it.

 - a. Learn Proper Pronunciation of Names
 - i. Our science community is diverse, with participants from many cultures and countries, so it is likely that we will all occasionally encounter names we are unfamiliar with. In addition to asking people how to pronounce their names, there are growing resources online for hearing the more common names from other languages and cultures.
 - ii. Some institutions have purchased licenses for services like [NameCoach](#) or [NameDrop](#) that allow for users to record their own names and integrate an audio names database into other applications like Blackboard or customer relationship management software. But even if you as an individual don't have access to these, there are other resources online for learning pronunciation and creating your own audiofile of your name. Here's a couple of useful links:
